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#### THE ASCENSION OF THE LORD – YEAR C

#### **First Reading**

# Acts 1:1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles Why are you standing here looking into the sky? Jesus has been taken into heaven.

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is,' he had said, 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.' Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians *He made Jesus to sit at his right hand in heaven.* 

May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a spirit of wisdom and perception of what is revealed, to bring you to full knowledge of him. May he enlighten the eyes of your mind so that you can see what hope his call holds for you, what rich glories he has promised the saints will inherit and how infinitely great is the power that he has exercised for us believers. This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named, not only in this age, but also in the age to come. He has put all things under his feet, and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

#### Lk 24:46-53

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

While blessing them, he was taken to heaven.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from



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the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this. 'And now I am sending down to you what the Father has promised. Stay in the city then, until you are clothed with the power from on high.' Then he took them out as far as the outskirts of Bethany, and lifting up his hands he blessed them. Now as he blessed them, he withdrew from them and was carried up to heaven. They worshipped him and then went back to Jerusalem full of joy; and they were continually in the Temple praising God.

#### **REFLECTION by Fr Victor**

On this seventh Sunday of Easter, we celebrate the solemnity of Ascension. It is an important solemnity that marks the return of Jesus to the Father. Together with the Resurrection, it is a manifestation of the victory of Christ. The saying nothing good lasts forever might be a good way to start reflecting on the Feast of the Ascension and the gospel for the solemnity of Ascension. With his Ascension, the earthly mission of Jesus comes to an end; he has through his life, death and resurrection accomplished the plan and will of God. The Kingdom of God has begun. We can imagine the sadness of Jesus' friends as he prepares to leave them. It marks the start of the time when they have to live without him being physically with them. They now have to realise that he will never eat, pray or walk with them as he used to; that time is over. He is gone. However, there is another side to his departure. As this part of Jesus' life ends, he now passes his mission onto his friends and followers. While Jesus' earthly ministry ends, theirs is just beginning. One chapter of Jesus' life is ending and another is just beginning. The gospel makes this very clear. Jesus says to his followers; 'Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation.' (Mk 16:15) As Jesus leaves them, he also at the same time

passes on them huge responsibility of carrying on the work of proclaiming the Kingdom of God. And this is what they did.

This ordinary group of men and women are the ones who were chosen by Jesus to be the witnesses of the resurrection. Through their words and actions, the world and the whole of creation will know that Jesus is alive and more present than ever he was. As Jesus' life and ministry end, theirs begins.

Today the responsibility of carrying on Jesus' ministry of building God's Kingdom is now ours. Today and every day, Jesus says to you and me, 'Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation.' The first followers of Jesus are our ancestors, and we are their descendants. It is now up to each of us as best we can, each in our way to carry on the mission of Jesus. Through us, the quality of our daily lives, our words, and our actions the world will know that Jesus is alive, present and active in our world.

Even though we celebrate the Ascension of Jesus, he has not left, deserted, or abandoned us. He is with us when we pray for each other and when we hear the scriptures proclaimed. He is with us when we share his Body and Blood together. He is with us when we reach out to care for and support each other. He is with us when we do our best each day to live our lives as his followers and disciples. Just as Jesus was with and working with his first followers, so too today Jesus is with and working with each of us today.

#### Alleluia! Stay Healthy, Stay Safe and Stay Blessed! 'LISTEN!': WORLD COMMUNICATIONS SUNDAY

Pope Francis chose the single word, "Listen!" as the theme for the 56th World Communications Day. The Holy See says, "Pope Francis is asking the world to listen again." The pandemic has affected and wounded everyone, and everyone needs to be heard and comforted. Listening is also fundamental for good information. The search for truth begins with listening. And so does witnessing through the means of social communication. Every dialogue, every relationship begins with listening. For this reason, in order to grow, even professionally, as communicators, we need to relearn to listen a lot. Jesus himself asks us to pay attention to how we listen (cf. Lk 8:18). To be able to truly listen requires courage, and a free and open heart, without prejudice. At this time when the whole Church is invited to listen in order to learn to be a synodal Church, we are all invited to rediscover listening as essential for good communication.
