First Reading

Is 66:10-14

A reading from the prophet Isaiah I will send toward Jerusalem peace like a river.

Rejoice, Jerusalem, be glad for her, all you who love her! Rejoice, rejoice for her, all you who mourned her! That you may be suckled, filled, from her consoling breast, that you may savour with delight her glorious breasts. For thus says the Lord: Now towards her I send flowing peace, like a river, and like a stream in spate the glory of the nations. At her breast will her nurslings be carried and fondled in her lap. Like a son comforted by his mother will I comfort you. And by Jerusalem you will be comforted. At the sight your heart will rejoice, and your bones flourish like the grass. To his servants the Lord will reveal his hand. **Responsorial Psalm** Ps 65:1-7. 16. 20. R. v.1 (R.) Let all the earth cry out to God with joy. 1. Cry out with joy to God all the earth,

Second Reading Gal 6:14-18

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Galatians The marks I carry on my body are those of Jesus Christ.

The only thing I can boast about is the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom the world is crucified to me, and I to the world. It does not matter if a person is circumcised or not; what matters is for him to become an altogether new creature. Peace and mercy to all who follow this rule, who form the Israel of God. I want no more trouble from anybody after this; the marks

on my body are those of Jesus. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit, my brothers. Amen.

Lk 10:1-12. 17-20

Gospel Acclamation Col 3:15. 16

Alleluia, alleluia!

May the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, and the fullness of his message live within you. Alleluia!

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Your peace will rest upon him.

The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, in pairs, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit. He said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road. Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, "Peace to this house!" And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages, do not move from house to house. Whenever you go into a town where they make you welcome, eat what is set before you.

Cure those in it who are sick, and say, "The kingdom of God is very near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not make you welcome, go out into its streets and say, "We wipe off the very dust of your town that clings to our feet, and leave it with you. Yet be sure of this: the kingdom of God is very near." I tell you, that on that day it will not go as hard with Sodom as with that town.' The seventy-two came back rejoicing. 'Lord,' they said, 'even the devils submit to us when we use your name.' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you. Yet do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven.'

REFLECTION by Fr Victor

Get up! Stand up! Show up! This is the encouragement given to us today by our First Nations brothers and sisters. This Sunday is Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday. It is the response to the Gospel story (Lk 10:1-9) in which Jesus sends out seventy-two of his disciples on mission. They go out to bring a greeting of peace and the good news that the Kingdom of God is very near. But this is no walk in the park. This is not a Sunday picnic. They are sent out as lambs among wolves. They carry no purse, no haversack, or sandals.

They know only too well that our missionary journey as the Australian Church also makes demands upon us. Stirring ourselves to action, to stand with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters, to show up; to show ourselves in solidarity, that is, so that together we can lead Australia, towards Justice, Peace, and Reconciliation. That's a very great challenge. As for the seventy-two so for us. Any success is God's work. But we need to accept the call to mission. The harvest is rich; it's waiting.

St. Paul (Gal 6:14) knows what it is about. "The only thing I can boast about", he says, "is the cross of Christ". He has suffered for his mission. He bears the scars. But he says (Gal 6:17), "the marks on my body are those of Jesus". Paul is convinced that in suffering with crucified Christ, he is also transformed into the Risen Lord. What matters, he affirms, is we become "an altogether new creature" (2Cor 5:17).

Today, we look to a new future of Respect and Reconciliation; we stand together with First Nations Peoples in the Church, asking the Holy Spirit of the Risen Lord to renew the face of the earth. We stand hoping to catch a clearer glimpse of God's Kingdom in our midst. The Gospel's tough message, its missionary message, it's hopefilled message is a call to all of us.

S t Thomas the Apostle was one of the twelve disciples commissioned by Jesus. In John's Gospel when upon hearing that Jesus had risen from the dead, Thomas replied, "Except I shall see in his hands the print of the nails, and put my finger into the print of the nails, and thrust my hand into his side, I will not believe". But when Jesus appeared Thomas then professed his faith – this story giving rise to the name "doubting Thomas". After Jesus' death it is widely believed he sailed to India in 52AD where he established several churches in the southern state of Kerala. Tradition suggests he was martyred in 72AD; speared to death at a site now called St Thomas Mount, before being buried in Mylapore in modern day Chennai. St Thomas is one of the patron saints of India.

Feast of St Thomas the Apostle 3 July

O Glorious St. Thomas Your grief for Jesus was such that it would not let you believe He had risen unless you actually saw Him and touched His wounds. But your love for Jesus was equally great and it led you to give up your life for Him. Pray for us that we may grieve for our sins which were the cause of Christ's sufferings. Help us to give ourselves in His service and so earn the title of "blessed" which Jesus applied to those who would believe in Him without seeing Him.
