A reading from the book of Genesis

The sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith.

God put Abraham to the test. 'Abraham, Abraham,' he called.' Here I am' he replied. 'Take your son,' God said 'your only child Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him as a burnt offering, on a mountain I will point out to you.'

When they arrived at the place God had pointed out to him, Abraham built an altar there, and arranged the wood. Then he bound his son Isaac and put him on the altar on top of the wood. Abraham stretched out his hand and seized the knife to kill his son.

But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven. 'Abraham, Abraham' he said. 'I am here' he replied. 'Do not raise your hand against the boy' the angel said. 'Do not harm him, for now I know you fear God. You have not refused me your son, your only son.' Then looking up, Abraham saw a ram caught by its horns in a bush. 
themselves by your descendants, as a reward for your obedience.'

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

God did not spare his own Son.

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us – he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us.

Gospel Mark 9:2-10

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

This is my Son, the beloved; listen to him.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Rabbi,' he said, 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them anymore but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain, he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.

REFLECTION by Fr Victor

This Sunday marks the beginning of the second week of our Journey with Christ. Last week he took us to the desert. This Sunday he is taking us to a mountain. The mountain in scripture is the place of revelation. Throughout the bible, it is often on the mountain that God's power and presence are revealed and experienced. Our readings today include two mountains on which people had an extraordinary experience of God: the mountain Abraham climbed with

blessing, and the mountain that Peter, James, and John climbed with the Son of God where they saw Jesus was transformed or transfigured in their presence. In the gospel this Sunday Jesus takes three of his apostles away from the activity, noise, and business of the marketplace. As he had done on his own before, he takes them to the mountain so that they can experience something wonderful and powerful. While they are there something out of the ordinary happened; before their very eyes, Jesus is transfigured, then they hear these words from God; 'This is my Son, the Beloved, listen to him.' What are we to make of this event? What does it mean for us today? The call, invitation and challenge of Lent is that we are to be transformed and changed. God calls to each of us and says, 'Come back to me with all your heart.' During this sacred season we are called to look honestly and humbly at our daily lives; at how we treat others, how we speak to them and how we behave. We are invited to ask ourselves, is there anything in my own daily life that needs to change and improve? How are we meant to be transformed during Lent before we celebrate the new life of Easter?

While on the mountain, Peter exclaims, 'It is wonderful for us to be here.' When we have the opportunity to gather with others to celebrate the Eucharist, could we make that our prayer and say, indeed, it is wonderful for us to be here. During the mass, we offer and present the ordinary bread and wine to God. God accepts, blesses, transforms, and then offers them back to us as the Body and Blood of his Son. However, not only during Lent, but also whenever we are at mass, we are meant to be changed and transformed into the people God wants us to be. With faith and courage can we also offer our own ordinary daily lives to God with the bread and wine? God will accept, bless, and transform us too, if we are open to allowing God to act powerfully in our lives. Just as those with Jesus left the mountain changed by what they heard and saw, we too in our own way are meant to leave mass changed and renewed by what we have experienced with each other. This week let's pray that we too will be transfigured by God's love, compassion, and forgiveness as we continue our journey through Lent with Jesus and each

God's Word (Lenten Sculpture)

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'Tests of faith'.

God really put Abraham to a tough test. What can be more precious to a parent than her or his own child? Asking Abraham to sacrifice his son is seen by Christians as a foreshadowing of what God will do in sacrificing Jesus to rescue us from eternal death. Abraham set about doing what God required, getting everything ready for the sacrifice. But what a relief it must have been when the Lord's messenger stopped the sacrifice.

The psalm reads as though it could have been written by Abraham. The psalmist still believes in God despite all that he was asked to give up. Even in the midst of great trial, the author's faith is not diminished.

The reading from Romans allows us to see that God didn't ask Abraham to do anything God wasn't willing to do. What other proof should we need of God's love than the sacrifice of God's Son?

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus takes a few of his disciples up a mountain. Elijah and Moses appear and talk with Jesus. They represent the Law and the prophets, which previously conveyed the promises of God. Jesus is the fulfilment of both. The voice of God makes it clear who Jesus is, 'This is my Son, my beloved. Listen to him.' Jesus asks the disciples to keep secret what they just saw and heard — what they know will not be revealed to all until after Jesus' Resurrection.

Coming down from the mountain, Jesus talks about his death. The disciples do not understand that to share in God's glory is to share in Jesus' suffering and death.
