First Reading Job 7:1-4. 6-7

A reading from the book of Job

I am filled with sorrow all day long.

Job began to speak:

Is not man's life on earth nothing more than pressed service.

his time no better than hired drudgery?
Like the slave, sighing for the shade,
or the workman with no thought but his wages,
months of delusion I have assigned to me,
nothing for my own but nights of grief.
Lying in bed I wonder, 'When will it be day?'
Risen I think, 'How slowly evening comes!'
Restlessly I fret till twilight falls.
Swifter than a weaver's shuttle my days have

passed,

and vanished, leaving no hope behind. Remember that my life is but a breath, and that my eyes will never again see joy.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 9:16-19. 22-23

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

Punishment will come to me if I do not preach the Gospel.

I do not boast of preaching the gospel, since it is a duty which has been laid on me; I should be punished if I did not preach it! If I had chosen this work myself, I might have been paid for it, but as I have not, it is a responsibility which has been put into my hands. Do you know what my reward is? It is this: in my preaching, to be able to offer the Good News free, and not insist on the rights which the gospel gives me.

So, though I am not a slave of any man I have made myself the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could. For the weak I made myself weak. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessings.

Gospel Mark 1:29-39

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

He cured many who suffered from diseases of one kind or another.

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

REFLECTION by Fr Victor

On this fifth Sunday of ordinary time, the holy mother church encourages us to follow Christ, who continues doing good. He, and his apostles carried out their mission as a responsibility and not just for wages. Therefore, he liberates and calls us to serve others freely.

In the Gospel this Sunday, we hear about three different dimensions of the ministry of Jesus. Jesus shows His innate ability to heal by restoring the health of the mother-in-law of Peter, and various others who came to Him. He gains his strength through his prayer to His Abba Father in a solitary place. He also expresses His commitment to

preach the Good News of the Kingdom of God to all humankind. Through these different dimensions of ministry, such as healing, prayer, and preaching, Jesus calls us to engage in the efforts to build the Kingdom of God. The hope with which people seek Him reveals the impact of his ministry on their lives.

Healing, praying, and preaching are the elements that are needed very much in the world today. Today, people long for persons who can listen to them attentively and compassionately and be able to console and heal their inner pain and suffering. They seek for people who can share the Good News of the Kingdom not just in words but through integrated life, as they believe that it will give them ultimate joy and hope in their life. People seek for persons who are deep in relationship with God and pray for them. So, can we be authentic healers, true persons of prayer, and tireless preachers like Jesus?

Let us pray to the Lord, who has set an example for all of us to heal, pray and preach, to help us to imbibe these elements in our lives. So that we may proclaim Jesus through our worthy living. May our life and mission be a shadow of his presence in the world.

A Reply to Paul

A major theme of the Scripture readings is 'Hope in the Gospel of Jesus'.


The reading from Job speaks of the burdens of the world and of the temptation to despair in the midst of them. In contrast, the psalmist offers hope that the Lord will be there to heal human brokenness.

Paul tells the Corinthians that as a Christian he has no choice but to preach the Gospel, and that in doing so, he will be blessed. The Good News of Jesus is not to be heard and stored away on a shelf, but rather lived and preached by us.

The Gospel of Mark offers hope in the face of human afflictions, as Jesus heals sick people and expels demons. Proclaiming the Gospel in word and action exhausts the body and spirit, so Jesus retreats to spend time in prayer. In doing so, he finds new vigour and strength to continue his mission of proclaiming the Good News.
