First Reading

Acts of the Apostles 10:34. 37-43 A reading from the Acts of the **Apostles**

We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses - we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their

sins forgiven through his name.'

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 117:1-2. 16-17. 22-23. R. v.24

(R.) Alleluia!

1. Give thanks to the Lord for he is good. for his love has no end. Let the sons of Israel say: 'His love has no end.' (R.)

2. The Lord's right hand has triumphed; his right hand raised me up. I shall not die, I shall live and recount his deeds. (R.)

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Colossians

Gospel John 20:1-9

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead.

It was very early on the first day of the week and still dark, when Mary of Magdala came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away from the tomb and came running to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved.



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'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb' she said 'and we don't know where they have put him.'So Peter set out with the other disciple to go to the tomb. They ran together, but the other disciple, running faster than Peter, reached the tomb first; he bent down and saw the linen cloths lying on the ground, but did not go in. Simon Peter who was following now came up, went right into the tomb, saw the linen cloths on the ground, and also the cloth that had been over his head; this was not with the linen cloths but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple who had reached the tomb first also went in; he saw and he believed. Till this moment they had failed to understand the teaching of scripture, that he must rise from the dead.

Fr. Victor's Reflection

Happy Easter!

Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays in the Christian calendar because of the renewal of life that it brings. Not only is Easter the beginning of the new life of the glorified Christ, but it is also equally, the beginning of the new life of all true Christians.

What is Easter then for us? Firstly, Easter is a celebration of faith. The gospel (Jn 20:1-9) tells how important faith is in understanding the resurrection of Christ. There are three disciples mentioned in the gospel passage, namely, Mary of Magdala, Peter, and the disciple whom Jesus loved (who is to be interpreted as John). The three became first witnesses to the empty tomb, but they had different reactions when they saw it. Mary surmised that the body of Jesus was taken and was put somewhere. Her faith has not grown yet. Peter did not show any judgment of what he saw. But John had a praiseworthy reaction. Why? Because when he saw the empty tomb, "he believed."

The empty tomb is the object of our faith. Our faith in the resurrection of Jesus is directed at the empty tomb.

We don't need our bodily eyes because they could not understand the event. We should use another set of eves. We should look at the empty tomb through the eyes of faith, so that we could see more clearly the meaning of Christ's rising for us. Often our faith can be compared to that of Mary of Magdala. It is not yet a grown or mature faith. But faith is a process. The Mary of Magdala in us should be transformed into John. In other words, we must believe and strengthen our faith in Christ who has been raised by God from the dead.

Secondly, Easter is a celebration of joy. The responsorial psalm captures the feeling: "This is the day that the Lord has made! Let us rejoice and be glad." This joy has its basis on the new life that Christ has offered us through his resurrection. We have a share in that new life. It can be seen as a gift for us from the risen Lord. But it is also a task. St Paul emphasises that in the second reading. He says that we should "celebrate the feast, not with the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth." Easter could have no meaning for us if we nevertheless cling to the old sinful life. Easter is about new life, a new life in Christ.

Thirdly, Easter reminds us of our calling as "witnesses" of Christ. This is the tone of the preaching of Peter in the first reading. He says, "We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem". The witnessing of the disciples of Jesus is witnessing par excellence because they really witness to what they had seen and heard. Our kind of witnessing may be different. The resurrection of Christ influences our life. We have been transformed by Christ. As Easter people, we can be bringers of hope for others. We share in the risen life of Christ. By that, we live and exist for love and for the truth.

This is the meaning of Easter. With the resurrection of Christ, God has renewed our life totally from within because the Spirit of the Risen Christ lives in us.

Holy Land Collection (Good Friday)

The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday, March 29th. This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment, housing. Parishes, and orphanages. It is also used to maintain over 70 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus. Due to the ongoing war, the Church and people of the Holy Land are still struggling with reduced income due to fewer pilgrims and lower church attendance around the world. In 2023 Australian Catholics were once again extremely generous and we were able to send to the Holy Land nearly \$1.4 million [\$1.4 million (2022), \$1,126,098 (2021), \$406,023 (2020) and \$1.3 million (2019)]. The reality for the Holy Land mission is that they will continue to face challenges financial and spiritual and so we again ask Catholics around the world again to be as generous as possible, with their financial support as well as the spiritual support. Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land on Good Friday.
