First Reading

Jeremiah 38:4-6. 8-10

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

You bore me to be a man of strife for the whole world.

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank.

Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

With so many witnesses in a great cloud on every side of us, we too, then, should throw off everything that hinders us, especially the sin that clings so easily, and keep running steadily in the race we have started. Let us not lose sight of Jesus, who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection: for the sake of the joy which was still

in the future, he endured the cross, disregarding the shamefulness of it, and from now on has taken his place at the right of God's throne. Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death.

'Do you suppose that I am here to bring peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. For from now on a household of five will be divided: three against two and two against three; the father divided against the son, son against father, mother against daughter, daughter against mother, mother-in-law against daughterin-law, daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.'

Fr Victor's Reflection

On this twentieth Sunday of Ordinary Time, the readings encourage us to fight against evil. In the first reading, Jeremiah was thrown into a cistern—sinking into mud—because he dared to speak God's truth to a people who preferred comfort over change. In the Gospel, Jesus comes as a disruptor, proclaiming a fire that will divide. It's a hard message. But both Jeremiah and Jesus show us that truth isn't always peaceful.

In our world today, whether it's climate change, economic inequality, or the fight for human rights, those who speak out the truth often face resistance. Like Jeremiah, their words fall on ears unwilling to hear the cost of justice. Yet, as the letter to Hebrews reminds us, we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses—those who have endured the struggle. Jesus, too, endured the cross, despite its shame. He didn't come to bring superficial peace, but a peace that comes through transformation, even if it burns. The fire of truth doesn't always bring instant harmony—it challenges systems, uproots complacency, and invites us into discomfort. The fire Jesus brings

is to purify, transform, and save us from the perils that afflict us. In this fire, we are called to a higher purpose, a deeper commitment to justice. Whether in small acts of kindness or in grand movements of resistance, we're called to bear witness to the truth. Are we ready to let that fire burn within us? To speak out when silence seems easier, to stand firm when the crowd pushes us aside?

Let us pray to the Lord, to kindle in us the fire of truth, and give us the courage to endure the cost of peace.




