On the way through the wilderness, the Israelites lost patience. They spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt to die in this wilderness? For there is neither bread nor water here; we are sick of this unsatisfying food.'

At this God sent fiery serpents among the people; their bite brought death to many in Israel. The people came and said to Moses, 'We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you. Intercede for us with the Lord to save us from these serpents.' Moses interceded for the people, and the Lord answered him, 'Make a fiery serpent and put it on a standard. If anyone is bitten and looks at it, he shall live.' So Moses fashioned a bronze serpent which he put on a standard, and if anyone was bitten by a serpent, he looked at the bronze serpent and lived.

REFLECTION by Fr Victor

The Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday has been inscribed in the liturgical calendar of the Maitland-Newcastle Diocese, as a way for us to 'live in remembrance' of the pain and suffering caused by the abuse within our community. On this Perpetual Day of Remembrance, we, as Church in the diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, are called to remember those of our brothers and sisters who have been harmed – abused – by some members of our Church, and who were further harmed by having an insensitive and cruel disregard for others who placed the reputation of the Church above the lives and safety of innocents.

This Sunday we celebrate the Exaltation of the Cross. The words 'exaltation' and 'cross' don't normally belong together. 'exaltation' suggests celebration, achievement, recognition. 'Cross' indicates suffering, humiliation, defeat. How could anyone who ended up crucified ever be said to have triumphed. It is hard to think of a greater paradox that the phrase 'the exaltation of the cross'. Yet, as Christians, we don't find that phrase in any way strange. When we look on the cross with the eyes of faith, we don't simply see the tragic ending of a good man's life. Here was a divine love that became a human love in the life and death of Jesus, a love so powerful that it was in no way diminished by the experience of rejection, hatred, and all that was most sinister and corrupt in the human spirit. The exaltation of the cross is the triumph of love over hatred, of life over death. The triumph of that Good Friday is a triumph in which we all continue to share. The light that shone in that awful darkness continues to shine on all of us. The love that burst forth from the hill of Golgotha two thousand years ago continues to flow into all our lives.

The stories of those who have been abused and harmed, the stories of those who walk that journey with survivors, the stories of those who have had their innocence stolen, had a direct influence on us. Their pain, their anger, their loss should and must encourage us on to change to a conversion of heart and mind.

The conversion we are called to is to ensure that those who have been harmed are supported and assisted, that we face the truth of our past with honesty, that we commit ourselves to ensure that we do all that we can to make our Church, our communities, places where children and the vulnerable are safe.

We cannot change the past, nor can we ignore it. We cannot pretend that some members of our Church did not abuse children, nor can we nullify our responsibility to provide remedy in ways that are meaningful. So, our task of conversion is not just momentary. It is not only putting safeguarding measures in place and complying with externally set standards but also to commit perpetually for the cause of victims and survivors and never repeat the past again.
