

First Reading

Isaiah 42:1-4. 6-7

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Here is my servant, my chosen one in whom I am well pleased.

Thus says the Lord:

Here is my servant whom I uphold,
my chosen one in whom my soul delights.
I have endowed him with my spirit
that he may bring true justice to the nations.

Second Reading

Acts of the Apostles 10:34-38

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

God anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power.

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.'

'It is true, God sent his word to the people of Israel, and it was to them that the good news of peace was brought by Jesus Christ – but Jesus Christ is Lord of all men. You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him, Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil.'

Gospel Matthew 3:13-17

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

When Jesus was baptised, the heavens were opened and the Spirit of God came upon him.

Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to be baptised by John. John tried to dissuade him. 'It is I who need baptism from you,' he said 'and yet you come to me!' But Jesus replied, 'Leave it like this for the time being; it is fitting that we should, in this way, do all that righteousness demands.' At this, John gave in to him.

As soon as Jesus was baptised he came up from the water, and suddenly the heavens opened and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming down on him. A voice spoke from heaven, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on him.'

Reflection by Fr Victor

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord brings the Christmas season to a close and opens the door to Jesus' public ministry. As Jesus steps into the waters of the Jordan, He stands in solidarity with humanity, embracing our weakness and showing us the path of humble obedience. In that sacred moment, the heavens open, the Spirit descends like a dove, and the voice of the Father proclaims, "**You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.**"

This feast invites us to remember our own baptism. Through baptism, we are claimed as God's beloved sons and daughters, washed clean, and filled with the Holy Spirit. On the day of our baptism, God called each of us His beloved child too. He promised to be with us always, to forgive us, and to help us grow in love. Parents and godparents promised to help children learn about Jesus and to show them how to live as His followers. It is not merely a past event, but a living call to renew our identity and mission as Christians. We are baptized not only to belong, but to be sent—to live lives of faith, service, and love.

As families, this feast also invites us to talk about baptism at home. You might look at baptism photos, light a candle, or make the Sign of the Cross together and thank God for the gift of faith. Children can remember that whenever they do something kind, forgiving, or loving, they are living their baptism.

For families, this feast is a beautiful reminder that faith begins at home. Children learn about God not only at church or school, but especially by watching how their families pray, forgive, help others, and show love every day. Living our baptism means choosing kindness, honesty, and care for one another.

As we begin Ordinary Time, may this celebration encourage us to renew our baptismal promises, reject all that distances us from God, and courageously witness to Christ in our families, workplaces, schools, and communities. May we live each day knowing that we are deeply loved and called to bring God's light to the world.

"You are my beloved." May these words echo in our hearts and guide our lives throughout the year.
